Strong Start

Parents interested in attending Strong Start are invited to register at the office (please bring your child's birth certificate and care card). We offer Strong Start 5 days a week from 9:00 am – noon. Strong Start programs provide a rich learning environment designed for early learning development-language, physical, cognitive, social and emotional. Mrs. Schindle leads learning activities where children find opportunities to make friends and interact with others of similar ages.

Participate with your young child (aged birth to five) in play-based learning activities – including stories, music and art. At no cost to families, this early learning drop-in program helps prepare children for success in kindergarten. **Strong Start starts: Tuesday Sept 24th.**

Drop off and pick up

A reminder that all vehicles in the pick-up loop must have engines turned off when picking up or dropping off your children. This is an idle-free zone.

Please move forward as space opens to keep congestion to a minimum. The left lane in the loop is to be left open so you can pull out once your child is safely in the car. If you need to get out of your vehicle, please park in the parking lot adjacent to the bus loop.

We will work with you and the teacher to resolve the problem or refer you to someone who can be of greater assistance. Please feel free to call the school and make an appointment to address any concerns at all.

The expanded 2024 event will include a pancake breakfast, community powwow, bouncy castles, autograph signing (featuring Phyllis (Jack) Webstad – founder of the Orange Shirt Society), an actionpacked evening hockey game, and energizing indigenous entertainment (featuring Jordan Hart, Susan Aglukark, and a not to be missed performance by Halluci Nation).

Truth and reconciliation can be achieved through dialogue, interaction, and education. Our mission is to create awareness of the intergenerational impacts of Indian Residential Schools.

ESTABLISHING A ROUTINE TO HELP GET TO SCHOOL ON TIME

- Give yourself and children enough time to get ready. No TV on school mornings can help.
- Provide students their own alarm. Teaching kids to set and use their own alarm can help them learn responsibility for their own personal practices.
- Try setting the alarm 30 minutes earlier for students who need more time to get ready for school,
- Plan ahead the night before, such as: identifying and pre-prepping breakfast, having kids choose their clothes and shoes the night before, and packing backpacks with completed homework and snacks/water.
- Set a regular bedtime schedule. Age should be a consideration in making decisions.
- Get proper rest and go to bed early yourself. Your health and well-being are important, too.
- Have your child go to bed 10 minutes earlier and get up 10 minutes earlier.
- Have kids bathe or shower in the evening.
- Help your child relax before bedtime with a story, instead of the stimulation of television.
- Have schoolwork and lunch ready and laid out, ready to go. Create a special folder for completed assignments.
- Provide regular study times and a quiet, clean area for doing homework so your children don't avoid school because their assignments are not complete.
- Have your child walk to school or the bus stop with another child who is always on time.
- Limit / balance extra-curricular activities.
- Have a back-up plan for cold weather and organize cold weather gear the night before.



SAFER SCHOOLS TOGETHER Student Violence Threat Risk Assessment (VTRA) Fair Notice for Students and Parents Cariboo-Chilcotin School District No. 27

Dear Students & Parents/Guardians,

Cariboo-Chilcotin School District is committed to creating and maintaining school environments in which students, staff, parents/guardians/caregivers, and others feel safe. Schools cannot ignore any threat of violence. This notice provides some information for students, parents and guardians about the approach to responding to potential threats.

What is a threat?

A threat is an expression of intent to do harm or act out violently against someone or something. Threats may be verbal, written, drawn, posted on the internet, or made by gesture.

Duty to report:

To keep school communi-

ties safe and caring, staff, parents/ guardians/caregivers, students, and community members must report all threat related behaviour to the school principal.

How to Report:

Members of the school community may contact the school office and ask to speak to the principal directly to report or make an online report through the <u>erase</u> link featured on the district and school websites.

What is the purpose of a student threat assessment?

 To ensure and promote the emotional and physical safety of students, staff, parents, the student making the threat, and others. To ensure a full understanding of the context of the threat. • To understand the factors contributing to the person of concern's (threat-maker's) behaviour. • To be proactive in developing an intervention plan that addresses the emotional and physical safety of the person of concern.

 To promote the emotional and physical safety of all.

What behaviours warrant a Student Violence Threat Risk Assessment to be initiated?

A student threat assessment will be initiated for behaviours including, but not limited to: • Verbal/written threats to harm/ kill others ("clear, direct, and plausible")

 Threats made via social media to harm, kill, or cause serious property damage • Serious violence or violence with intent to harm and kill • Indicators of suicidal ideation as it relates to fluidity (homicidal/suicidal)

Weapon possession (including replicas)

 Bomb threats (or possession/detonation of devices)

 Hate incidents motivated by factors including, but not limited to: race, culture, religion, and/or sexual orientation • Sexual intimidation, sextortion, extortion or assault • Domestic, interpersonal, relational violence
Gang-related intimidation and violence • Fire setting (contextual) Collection Notice:

The School District is subject to personal information privacy laws and will undertake the collection of this information in compliance with the requirements of such laws, including by limiting collection to information that is relevant and necessary to address a risk or threat and by ensuring that information is collected from online sources is only collected from open-source sites. The School District will not collect information as part of a threat assessment unless there is reason to believe that a threat exists. Information collected as part of a threat assessment may be provided to law enforcement authorities in appropriate circumstances.
