Checking (complete in June):	All the "Taking Action" points mentioned above were participated in throughout the whole year, despite the numerous changes in classroom teachers. Some of the classes were more involved in the journal writing and creative writing based on the outdoor walks, but all classes did complete some writing projects. The teachers report that students were more enthusiastic about their writing due to the connections and observations they'd made during their walks and with the outdoor art they produced on their walks. As the year progressed more high-level art was produced and students' writing, based on the environment and the wildlife they observed, improved in length and quality. The teachers also reported that students were very disappointed if their outdoor ed classes had to be cancelled and that they were more engaged in other subjects when they could apply the knowledge and experience they had been a part of. The teachers belief that, based on their observation of students' enthusiasm and the quality of their writing, that the project was a huge success and the answer to the inquiry is the outdoor ed classes most definitely inspire the artistic and linguistic abilities of the students at Horsefly school.	
Reflection (complete in June):	The staff is glad that they had the opportunity to be a part of this inquiry and hope that once the school's outdoor classroom is built with this further enhance the students' connections and spur them on to produce even better artistic and linguistic assignments.
