BACKGROUND

Deputy Superintendent Cheryl Lenardon and Principals Kimberley Ikebuchi and Holly Zurak attended the Ministry of Education Mental Health and Substance Use Conference last Spring. This team collaborated on identifying some key priorities and approaches to support mental health in Cariboo-Chilcotin School District that were emerging or "nexts" for us.

DISCUSSION

The document SD 27 Mental Health Plan – Nurtured by Nature pulls together the highlights of our planning to support mental health for students, staff, and families under the themes of learning about mental health, creating community, and learning on the land.

As we are improving our structures, processes, and procedures across the district, and looking at everything through a system thinking lens, we are beginning to see more alignment of the work in general. RE: Board/Authority Authorized (BAA) Courses – Hockey 10 – 12

BACKGROUND

BAA courses provide an opportunity for educators to explore content beyond the boundaries of BC Ministry of Education and Child Care curriculum. BAA courses help educators respond to the local needs of schools and their communities, and to provide choice and flexibility for students. BAA courses may overlap with Big Ideas and Curricular Competencies of Ministry courses.

DISCUSSION

These courses have been developed based on community demand over a number of years and were created using BAA courses developed in School District 57. Every year there are wait lists for the hockey academy's from grades 8 – 12.

Hockey 10 thru 12 provide an opportunity for youth to develop or continue developing skills in hockey and provide a space to participate in hockey in the community in a non-threatening, low-cost, low-risk experience. These courses set the foundation for students to enjoy ice hockey as a lifetime activity and allow participants to develop knowledge and skills such as goal setting, sportsmanship, integrity, commitment, character building, mental training, social responsibility, team play, cross training, and individual hockey skill development.

Offering an alternative physical education elective in the community not only provides an additional option for students, it creates more availability in the school gym schedule and is a fantastic opportunity to collaborate with educational partners. Some key collaborative partners include: Hockey Canada, BC Hockey, Williams Lake Minor Hockey, the City of Williams Lake, and the Total Ice hockey complex.

RECOMMENDATION

THAT the Board of Education approve the Board/Authority Authorized Courses, Hockey 10, Hockey 11, and Hockey 12 as elective offerings in School District 27

RE: Foundation Skills Assessment (FSA) as a Snapshot

BACKGROUND

This month, schools will once again proceed with the annual administration of the FSA for the 2022/23 school year. The grade 4 and grade 7 FSA provide information on the development of literacy and numeracy in student.

ISSUE

There has been some debate over the years regarding the inappropriate and inaccurate use of the data to "rank" schools. This use of the data is highly flawed and harmful. However, the assessment (designed by teachers) provides key information that can be used to inform instruction, especially since the assessment is now done early in the year.

First Nations rightsholders, Indigenous organizations, and many education partners have expressed the importance of FSA results in supporting our most vulnerable learners and advancing our commitment to reconciliation. The FSA provides an important line of sight into the learning trajectories for Indigenous students and other student groups. With multipartner consultation, the FSA aligns with BC's redesigned curriculum and the components of literacy and numeracy are measured in all provincial assessments. The Grade 4 FSA remains a significant predictor of future success.

It is important to realize that the FSAS is a "snapshot" of a moment in time, reflecting expected performance based on the previous year. In SD#27, staff have been working hard to better align the FSA with the regular, ongoing assessment that teachers do every day, providing a far more rounded picture of the literacy and numeracy development of children. We appreciate their ongoing effort and professionalism.
